


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## Best-selling American author and cultural activist M.G. Crisci, calls non-political understanding critical ingredient in mutual trust during talks at the American Center for Democracy and the U.S. Embassy in Moscow

(MOSCOW, October) The message to a packed presentation at the American Center was simple. Ordinary citizens from very different cultures can accomplish extraordinary things. It requires but one thing: mutual trust. And, mutual trust begins when one party reaches out to take the first step, and asks for nothing in return.

"When I first began to write the book *Call Sign, White Lily,* I quickly realized to capture Lilia Litvyak's amazing transformation from a little girl born in Moscow to the youngest and most successful female flying ace in the history of the world, I needed the help of people I did not know in a far off land with a culture that was very different than my own," said the author.

Three years and two trips later, the author, and his collaborators, a Russian Museum Curator, Valentina Vaschenko, and a Ukrainian English teacher Yelena Sivolap, could be proud of the book's publication.

With the release came unexpected awards, critical acclaim, three updated editions, and for a brief time, an electronic edition that became number one in the Amazon Kindle store. There was even the support of the Russian Cultural Centre in the United States and Moscow.

"While the project was difficult to execute for many reasons, when we were done, the three of us realized that by unconditionally trusting each other, we had done something nobody dreamed possible. That's why I'm hoping to build the kind of sales success to donate profits to the tiny Lilia Litvyak museum, behind a little school in her name in far off Krasny Luch.

"Interestingly, despite the support received elsewhere, the subsequent editorial and blogs, there was little interest at the government level in America. We actually, were about to give up, when we received invites to speak at the US Embassy and the American Center. The reception at both venues has exceeded our expectations. So all is well on both sides of the Atlantic now.

"The fact that we met with government officials from the United States, Russia and Great Britain on this trip, made us feel like we have accomplished something special. Everyone seemed fascinated with my two big dreams: a mainstream movie cooperatively produced by the American and Russian creative communities, and a multi-media exhibition based on Lilia's short but eventful life. I think both products would be wonderful vehicles for the world to better understand the Russian culture and soul, as observed by a non-Russian," said the author.
